MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Originally referred to as “Timberlake”, Erlanger was incorporated as a city on January 25, 1897. Our founding fathers took pride in their community as we continue to do so today. They worked hard to make Erlanger a place to raise their families and to run their businesses.

One hundred and sixteen years later, our city needs some aesthetic updates. You may have noticed some of the changes, or enhancements, that are in progress. Our “Gateway to Erlanger” project began this summer. Erlanger’s leaders felt that the entrance or “gateway” into Erlanger at Interstate 75 was not inviting. Trees along Commonwealth/Donaldson Avenue have been planted with much more to come, including an island. The goal is to make our exit appealing, yet safe.

The City’s sidewalk project continued with the completion of a sidewalk that connected our nature park, The Glades, with the Deerchase subdivision and Flagship Park. It is now possible to walk from our City Building to Flagship Park completely by sidewalks. It is the City’s goal to someday have all our neighborhoods connected. This project has been made possible through grant money when available.

Our “Dixie Beautification” project, also paid for with grant money, is almost complete. This area begins at Graves and Dixie, continuing to McAlpin and Dixie. It has revitalized an older section of Dixie while maintaining a “small town” feel. Currently, McAlpin at Dixie is closed with another grant project underway. McAlpin and Garvey will be realigned so that travelers can cross Dixie straight rather than at an angle.

Our final project is “Commonwealth Station”. The process of drafting new regulations for form-based zoning regulations along Commonwealth Avenue on the east side of Interstate 75 began in 2012. Potential for redevelopment in this area has been recognized by the City. Input from property owners and the general public have been obtained and will be used to establish a vision for future development.

While these changes may seem cosmetic, they also address many issues the City has had to face over the years. Similar to remodeling your home, the longer needs are put off, the more work it creates later. It is past time for these changes. Our Director of Economic Development, Dave Hahn, works diligently to obtain funding through grants so that many of these projects benefit our residents and business employees, but not at their expense.

FROM THE OFFICE OF THE CITY CLERK

Enclosed with this newsletter are the 2013 tax bills. All tax bills are mailed directly to the property or business owners. If you have an escrow account with a mortgage company, please forward your tax bill to them. We will only electronically send tax information to mortgage companies upon their request.

If you have an escrow account and to prevent duplicate payments, **please confirm with your mortgage company that they have paid your bill prior to December 31st.**

To receive a 2% discount, tax payments **MUST** be received by **October 31st**. We accept postmarks. **If you are paying in person, you will need to make that payment no later than Thursday, October 31st.**

The final date to pay your tax bill is December 31st. Starting January 1st, a 20% penalty is applied as well as 6% interest per annum.

Tax bills can be paid through mail, by credit card (Mastercard, Visa) over the phone, at the Bank of Kentucky, at www.ci.erlanger.ky.us, and at the Erlanger City Building.

If you are a homeowner residing in the home and are 65 years of age or on disability income, you may be eligible to receive a Homestead or Disability Exemption on your Kenton County and City of Erlanger property tax bills. This year’s Homestead Exemption is \$36,000.00. If you are eligible, the amount of the exemption is subtracted from your property’s assessed value so you will pay less property tax. To apply, please contact the Property Valuation Administrator (PVA) office at 859-392-1750.

Latest News From Erlanger Dispatch - There has been a lot in the news lately about emergency dispatch services in Northern Kentucky. Erlanger is STILL in the dispatch business. We are now dispatching both police and fire/ems calls for Erlanger, Elsmere and Crescent Springs.

In the event of an Emergency dial 9-1-1 and let the call taker know your location and what the emergency is. For all other non-emergency related matters where police or fire response is requested please call 859-727-2424 and the proper personnel will be dispatched to you.

The Erlanger Public Safety Communications Center (PSCC) is changing into The Erlanger Real Time Crime Center (RTCC). While both a PSCC and a RTCC take 9-1-1 calls and dispatch Police, Fire and EMS to incidents, a RTCC is more proactive in helping to stop and solve crime by monitoring camera feeds and doing deep research on suspects to assist officers.

The Erlanger RTCC will monitor camera feeds owned by the city and those owned by community businesses that provide access. Having someone available to view these camera feeds 24/7 allows dispatchers to identify crime and potential issues and be the eyes of Police, Fire and EMS if an incident occurs within the view of the cameras, providing real time information to responders so that decision making can start immediately and not after the responder arrives and begins evaluating the scene.

In crimes of violence or theft when a suspect has been identified but cannot be located, Dispatchers will have access to databases once reserved for Detectives. Using these databases Dispatchers will do deep research that might uncover information about the normal activities of a suspect that would allow patrol officers to locate them immediately instead of Detectives searching for them days later.

Crime mapping, trend analysis and other analytic functions that help officers know where criminal activity has been occurring and where to focus their efforts will also become a duty of the RTCC.



Kids are back in school - Children are headed back to school in the Erlanger-Elsmere School District and the Erlanger Fire/EMS Department would like to remind everyone to be extra cautious when driving around school zones and routes that students use to get to school. Pay attention to the possibility of reduced speed limits, crossing guards, and children crossing streets.

If you must travel through a school zone during the times that students are going to or from school, consider leaving a few minutes early to account for possible delays so that you are not putting anyone in danger by trying to rush.

Also, remember not to pass a school bus that is stopped to pick up or drop off children. There are occasions when students will have to cross in front of the bus and you may not see them if you attempt to pass. This is a very dangerous and illegal act. Please take extra caution to ensure all school children are able to travel to and from school safely.

Fire Prevention Week - It's time for Fire Prevention Week, and from October 6-12, 2013 Erlanger Fire/EMS is joining forces with the non-profit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) to remind local residents to 'Prevent Kitchen Fires.' During this year's fire safety campaign, firefighters and safety advocates will be spreading the word about the dangers of kitchen fires--most of which result from unattended cooking—and teaching local residents how to prevent kitchen fires from starting in the first place.

According to the latest NFPA research, cooking is the leading cause of home fires. Two of every five home fires begin in the kitchen—more than any other place in the home. Cooking fires are also the leading cause of home fire-related injuries.

"Often when we're called to a fire that started in the kitchen, the residents tell us that they only left the kitchen for a few minutes," said Fire Marshal Tim Deye. "Sadly, that's all it takes for a dangerous fire to start. We hope that Fire Prevention Week will help us reach folks in the community before they've suffered a damaging lesson."

Among the safety tips that firefighters and safety advocates will be emphasizing:

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, broiling, or boiling food.
- If you must leave the room, even for a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- When you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, stay in the home, and use a timer to remind you.
- If you have young children, use the stove's back burners whenever possible. Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the stove.
- When you cook, wear clothing with tight-fitting sleeves.
- Keep potholders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper and plastic bags, towels, and anything else that can burn, away from your stovetop.
- Clean up food and grease from burners and stovetops.

Fire Prevention Week is actively supported by fire departments across the country. Fire Prevention Week is the longest running public health and safety observance on record.

Passports - Applications for a passport can be picked up at the Erlanger City Building or can be downloaded from www.travel.state.gov.

The standard routine fee is \$110.00 payable to the U.S. Dept. of State and a \$25.00 processing fee payable to the City of Erlanger.

Passport hours are Monday-Friday from 7:30 AM to 4:30 PM.

To apply for a passport, you will need:

- Certified birth certificate
- A passport photo (available at Walgreens, CVS, AAA, etc.)
- Current identification (driver's license or state identification)
- Application
- Application fee (One check or money order per application; a separate processing fee of \$25 must be paid to the City of Erlanger per application via check, cash, money order, Visa MasterCard, or Discover)

It currently takes 4-6 weeks to have a passport processed, 2-3 weeks to have it expedited (an additional \$60.00 fee payable to the U.S. Dept. of State). Passports are good for ten years, five years for children.

Public Works Report - The Public Works Department will begin their annual **leaf collection program** the week of October 28, 2013 and it will continue through the week of December 26, 2013. The collection schedule can be viewed on line at www.ci.erlanger.ky.us and will be available for pick up at the City Building, Heritage Bank, Fifth Third Bankmart and the Bank of Kentucky.

If you have submitted your e-mail address to be placed on our Resident e-mail Database, the schedule will be electronically sent to you. If you are not on this, please go to www.ci.erlanger.ky.us to add your e-mail at the "E-mail Notifications."

The Public Works Department has divided the city into different zones. When looking at the schedule, first locate what zone your street is in, then find your zone on the schedule. The schedule allows for each street to be collected four times throughout the collection period with the exception of Stevenson Road and Commonwealth Avenue that are only collected twice because of traffic control requirements.

This year, the last date of leaf collection will be Friday, December 26th. After this date, equipment used for leaf collection will be prepared for winter usage and leaf disposal will be the responsibility of the homeowner.

Please remember to keep leaf piles behind the curb and do not place them in the street. Leaves must be out to the curb the morning of your scheduled collection date. If the leaf pile is blocked in any manner or contains anything that will not allow safe pick-up, a notice will be left on your door explaining that they were unable to collect your leaves.

Always be on the look out for Public Works' Team Members working in your area during leaf collection season and do your part to help provide them with a safe working environment as they provide this invaluable service to you. Be patient as they stop to collect leaf piles in your neighborhood, do not follow any of the trucks and or equipment too closely, and be alert as you traverse through work zones that they have set up.

In addition to the leaf collection program, the Public Works Department will also have their "**Christmas Tree Drop-off**" program again this year. Bare trees (no ornaments, plastic wrapping, lights) can be dropped off at 3516 Jack Scheben Drive from December 27, 2013 through January 10, 2014 Monday-Friday from 7:30am-4:00pm. The trees will be mulched and made available to Erlanger residents for pick up.

FOCUS ON ENERGY: SAVING GREEN BY GOING GREEN

Erlanger-Elsmere Schools have been working diligently to manage energy usage within the district – and the results are paying off.

Ensuring the district's buildings are as energy efficient as possible helps minimize the schools' impact on the environment – and saves valuable dollars that can be reinvested elsewhere. For the past few years, the district has partnered with Ian Holten of ZH Commissioning – an independent Energy Conservation Services provider – to troubleshoot energy inefficiencies and make improvements to reduce energy costs.

ZH Commissioning helps the district “save green by going green” – their consultants work with the district to help identify energy weak spots, supply a realistic approach to correct problems, comply with local and national codes, and provide recommendations for carrying out necessary work.

Since working together, the district has made adjustments as large as installing new HVAC (heating, ventilation, and air conditioning) plant controls at Miles Elementary to mounting automatic lighting controls in Lloyd's weight room, to implementing other energy-saving measures such as programmable thermostats and efficient fluorescent lighting.

And the savings really add up. For the period of January-May 2013, the district saved \$17,145 in energy bills over the same period in 2012. And for January-May 2013 as compared to January-May 2011, the savings is over \$42,000.

Even with these improvements, Erlanger-Elsmere Schools and ZH Commissioning plan to do more. They are studying the effects of the upgraded plant controls at Miles to determine whether similar upgrades would benefit the district's other elementary schools. More lighting upgrades are in the works. And, during the summer, when building usage is significantly decreased, an action plan is in place to manage cooling equipment, interior temperatures, and water heaters.

“It is fantastic to see the district's hard work pay off, literally,” says Mr. Holten. “Their everyday efforts -- from the administrators to the custodians, maintenance, faculty, and staff -- are the model for a successful recipe to combat rising energy costs. They really should be proud of the progress we've made!”

ARNETT ELEMENTARY HONORED AS A TOP SCHOOL IN KENTUCKY

Arnett Elementary has been recognized as one of the top schools in Kentucky in a survey that measures teaching conditions, student achievement, and school safety. It is the second consecutive time that Arnett has received this honor.

Arnett is the only elementary school in Northern Kentucky on the top-tier list, and one of only two schools in Northern Kentucky that made the list. (The other is Connor Middle School.)

Kentucky Commissioner of Education Terry Holliday made the announcement after a five-phase review process that resulted in the selection of 49 exemplary schools across the state. The measurement is the *Teaching, Empowering, Leading and Learning (TELL) Survey*, a nationally recognized survey used to measure teacher engagement and support, instructional practices, leadership, community engagement, student conduct, facilities and other factors.

"From my perspective, being identified again as one of the 49 TELL Honorable Mention schools says a great deal about the positive and safe school culture we have at Arnett Elementary," said Matthew Engel, principal of Arnett Elementary.

"Our students enjoy coming to school, our teachers enjoying working here, and as a result, our kids have a better opportunity to be successful academically. Many of our students are faced with obstacles in their lives that are beyond their control. This school has a great group of teachers that are willing to work together to help these children overcome those obstacles."

The selection of Arnett Elementary as one of the exemplary schools defines it as a "best practice" model for other schools. It also places Arnett in consideration for the Winners' Circle honor, to be awarded on September 30 at the Continuous Improvement Summit, co-sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Education, in Louisville.

Arnett Elementary serves approximately 370 children in preschool through fifth grade; the school is located at 3552 Kimberly Drive, Erlanger. It is one of four elementary schools in the Erlanger-Elsmere Independent School District, which serves 2,200 students and a residential population of approximately 20,000. *Enriching Every Student* is a signature theme at the heart of the school district's success.

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ERLANGER-ELSMERE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

CARING FOR THE WHOLE STUDENT: HEALTH CLINICS BREAK DOWN BARRIERS

For more than a decade, Erlanger-Elsmere Schools have operated a health clinic. Last school year, the district added a dental clinic to the mix. The clinics help minimize the impact of health and dental issues on learning, and also provide another convenient care option for students and their families.

“I think one of the most important things about the clinics is that they show how much the district really cares about the kids,” says Mary Burch, District Health Coordinator. “We realize that if the kids aren’t healthy, it makes it difficult for them to learn.”

A nurse practitioner provided by HealthPoint Family Care staffs the medical clinic, and the services provided are similar to those you’d find at a pediatrician’s office -- school physicals, sick visits, immunizations, simple lab tests, and education on chronic illnesses.

The dental clinic is staffed with a dentist, dental hygienist, and dental assistant. Initial visits usually consist of a standard dental exam and often result in a treatment plan. Fillings, extractions, and other dental treatments are all completed on site.

The programs have had many stories of success. One elementary student was the lowest in the reading group. Because of untreated asthma, he was often struggling to breathe, coughing, or sick at home. Once he was established with the nurse practitioner, he was treated for his asthma and his reading level significantly improved.

Another student had been seen in the health clinic a number of times for an abscessed tooth. The health clinic treated the symptoms of the abscess, but the student did not have health insurance so it was very expensive. Once the dental clinic opened, he was able to have the tooth extracted and the results were amazing. He was so appreciative that he wasn’t in pain anymore.

“If we can remove health and dental barriers, it makes it easier to educate the kids and make them more successful in life,” Ms. Burch adds. “I appreciate the chances they give the families in our district. It’s been a great help for a lot of families.”

SIDEBAR:

Any student from any school in the district is eligible for services. Students can be referred by a teacher, parent, or themselves. Parents complete permission form prior to visits, and are always contacted before any services are provided. Parents are welcome at the services, but are not required to be present.

The cost to visit the health clinic is \$30, and the program allows private insurance, bills through Medicaid, and offers a sliding fee scale to students without insurance. Dental services are also offered on a sliding fee scale; the maximum a family will pay out-of-pocket is \$120/year, no matter how much dental work a child needs.



EARLY BEGINNINGS: CRADLE SCHOOL

This year, Erlanger-Elsmere Schools will offer Cradle School -- a ten-week session that aims to bridge educational gaps by helping parents understand what their child needs to be prepared for kindergarten.

For the children, Cradle School is essentially a play date. Children will engage in play therapy to help determine developmental levels and needs. For parents, it’s an opportunity to learn from a host of professional experts about how to help their child thrive. Ms. Hope has plans to have nurses come to talk about well-child checkups and vaccinations; family resource professionals to talk about available community services; and librarians highlight the importance of literacy.

“We really just want to bring parents in to help them understand what their child needs,” Ms. Hope says.

The first 10-week Cradle School session will begin on September 13.

Sessions will be held each Friday from 9-11 a.m. at the Preschool Center at Arnett Elementary.
